Our 2025/6 Speaker Programme

9 September - Peter Skeggs-Gooch - A clematis for every season

Peter is the third generation owner of Thorncroft Clematis, a family nursery near Evesham, winners of 12 Chelsea Gold Medals. Over the years, he has acquired an intimate knowledge of the genus and will show what you can have in flower throughout the calendar year.

14 October - Annie Godfrey - Autumn fireworks

Annie is a garden designer and the owner of Daisy Roots, a small independent nursery in Hertford specialising in hardy perennials and ornamental grasses. Her talk will focus on how to keep the garden colourful right up until winter frosts threaten.

11 November - Twigs Way - A history of women in the garden

Twigs is a garden historian, author and lecturer on garden history and designed landscapes. Her talk about the female horticulturists through the centuries reveals how the fortunes of the female gardener have been as varied as their roles, from the early misfortunes of Eve to the successes of plant breeders.

9 December - Manoj Malde - My journey to Chelsea

Manoj Malde is an award-winning garden designer, TV presenter, RHS ambassador and judge known for his vibrant style and bold use of colour.

A former creative director and fashion designer, he has been creating gardens for both since 2011. He made his debut at the Chelsea Flower Show in 2017 with his garden, Beneath a Mexican Sky, which won a silver-gilt medal.

10 February - Timothy Walker - Rockery in the garden



Timothy is a welcome returning friend of the Society. He is a botanist, lecturer, author and a former director of the Oxford Botanic Garden.

The rock garden at the Botanic Garden has been rebuilt three times since 1926. His talk looks at the building of a rock garden, the plants that can be grown on it and includes examples of rock garden plants from all over the world.

10 March - Andrew Mikolajski - Permaculture for gardeners

Andrew is a horticultural consultant, speaker and author of 40 gardening titles. The term 'permaculture' was coined in the 1970s to describe a design system that creates sustainable gardens that mimic natural ecosystems. By working with nature rather than against it, you can reduce waste and your impact on the environment.

14 April - Paolo Arrigo, Franchi Seeds - Tips for spring sowing and perfect pesto

Franchi is the oldest family run seed company in the world, established in 1783, specialising in rare and heirloom seeds. Paolo, another returning friend, is a seedsman, and an enthusiastic champion of slow food, endangered vegetables and biodiversity.

A keen grower, he believes we shouldn't overcomplicate gardening and is adept at advising which plants will thrive in the UK climate.



12 May - Anne Rowe - Lost houses and gardens around Welwyn Garden City

Anne is a freelance landscape historian who has coordinated research for the Hertfordshire Gardens Trust since 1998 and lectures in landscape history. She has written several books about medieval parks and the history of Hertfordshire landscapes.

23 April - Pashley Manor Tulip Festival. £53 including coach, gratuities and garden entry. Depart 9.30am College Way, WGC.

Pashley Manor's spectacular Tulip Festival sees this garden, on the border of Sussex and

Kent, carpeted with over 40,000 tulips, creating stunning scenes to enjoy. A hundred varieties of tulip are planted in colour themed garden 'rooms' throughout the grounds and in

pot displays. <u>Bloms</u>
<u>Bulbs</u> marquee shows
tulips as cut flowers and
Bloms experts are on hand
throughout the Festival to
share their knowledge of
these beautiful bulbs and
to take orders from those
inspired by the



spectacle. The café serves locally sourced and homemade cakes, scones and light lunches, which can be enjoyed on the terrace.

17 July - The Abbey Gardens, Bury St Edmunds and Fullers Mill. £48 including coach, gratuities and garden entry. Depart 9.30am College Way, WGC.

The award-winning 14-acre Abbey Gardens, Bury St Edmunds is on the site of the former



approximately 20,000 plants are bedded out for the summer display. It is internationally renowned for its colourful and attractive displays and the heritage of its backdrop. Refreshments including light lunches are available in the gardens or a short walk away in the town. Fullers Mill Garden is a tranquil seven-acre

Benedictine Abbey. Created in 1837

waterside and woodland plantsman's paradise. It combines a beautiful site of light dappled woodland with a collection of unusual shrubs,

perennials, lilies and marginal plants. The garden was created by the late Bernard Tickner MBE. He moved to Fullers Mill in 1958 and spent over 50 years creating the garden you see today from rough scrub and woodland. In 2013, the garden was gifted to Perennial, for its long-term preservation.



16 September - Green Island Gardens and Langthorns Plantery. £48 including coach, gratuities, garden entry and group tour. Depart 9.30am College Way, WGC.

Green Island Gardens is 20 acres of award-winning private gardens. Professionally designed by its owner Fiona Edmond, who will be leading one of our tours, it is laid out as a series of structured gardens displaying a huge range of unusual trees, shrubs, perennials, and bulbs. Holding two National Collections with Plant Heritage for Hamamelis and Camellias (Autumn and Winter Flowering), Green Island is designed to create year-round horticultural interest and delights for the senses. In 2024 it



was the RHS Partner Garden of the Year overall winner and regional winner for East Anglia and the Midlands.



On our way back we are stopping at Langthorns Plantery to stock up ready for our autumn planting. It specialises in top quality ornamental plants, shrubs and trees, and boasts many uncommon and heritage species that are more difficult to obtain. The company motto 'We Live Plants; We Love Plants' reflects the dedication of Edward Cannon, a self-confessed plant addict, who took over the running of the Plantery in 2001.




Green roofs in London open to the public

120 The Garden is open six days a week from 10am until 9pm in the summer time and until 5pm in the winter. There is no need to book but you may need to queue.

Growing the All Aboarders woodland garden

In 2024 the WGC Horticultural Society made a donation to create a woodland garden on Platforms 3 and 4 at WGC station. Over the autumn and winter the group prepared the bed by removing some old plants and improving the soil followed by planting. The weather has not been kind, with a very wet autumn and winter followed by a very dry spring and summer. There have been some plant failures but All Aboarders continue to plant the bed,

concentrating on drought tolerant shade loving plants.



This summer All Aboarders again entered for an RHS Britain in Bloom 'It's Your Neighbourhood' award, having won Gold in both 2023 and 2024. The judges have not visited yet, but fingers crossed. Also, our colourful stall at the WGC Celebration Day in the Howard Centre in July attracted donations and interest in becoming a volunteer.

All Aboarders is a small, welcoming and diverse group, with gardening volunteers working on the station every week on alternate Thursday and Saturday mornings. lovely comments and thanks from the travelling public adds to the enjoyment.
